Welcome to our May 2022 Practice Week focusing on Participation! Once again, we have a week of events to inspire your practice with children and families and I'm especially pleased to see that not only will

This Practice Week is not just about learning. It is a celebration of the participation work already being undertaken across Children's Services, and a call to action for all of us to do more. It's an opportunity

to challenge ourselves about how far we seek out the views of children and families in developing ourselves and our services, and what else we can do to embrace opportunities to hear how our services are received and ensure people are given opportunities to co-produce, enhance and develop our services.

Participation is relevant to every role in every team in Children Services; we all have a part to play. There are numerous benefits of undertaking effective participation with children, young people, families and carers. These benefits, however, will only be fully realised when participation is part of who we are and how we work, not just at an individual level but throughout the organisation.

As part of this week we invite you to have a personal or team challenge to gather feedback from children and their families, partner agencies or the people you work with, to help you improve your day to day work. Work as a team to consider how you might reach out to the people whose voices need to influence your service the most. There is a 'Feedback Frenzy' workshop on Monday morning to help inspire you, and there is a session with the Leadership Team on Thursday afternoon to share best practice around participation. If you do nothing else, please use Friday afternoon to add a participatory question or activity into whatever work you are undertaking, to learn from it and take action!

Every relationship matters in Norfolk

Roxanne is a Practice Coach and a Trainer and Developer of Every Relationship Matter's in Norfolk.

Philip is a Head of Communities and Partnership and has led for Children's Services on working collaboratively across the children and families' system in supporting effective practice and helping Norfolk to adopt a 'think family' approach to young carers. More recently he has had the privilege of working with young carers and young adult carers on co-producing the new transition assessment and plan that we hope all young carers will be offered in Norfolk.

Every Relationship Matters in Nor-folk was created last year, through consultation with partners and parents/carers, with the aim of providing practitioners with the knowledge, tools and resources to be able to reduce parental conflict with families for positive intervention and bring about more effective participation. In this session, we will show you key areas of the training pack on offer and how parental conflict impacts on children's emotional wellbeing. We will talk you through the resources within the toolkit and explain how the tools can create change within your work.

Ruth is a Senior Practitioner in the Targeted Youth Support Service and a Youth Worker (JNC). Ruth holds a Master's Degree in Child and Family Research, where she focussed her thinking and writing around adolescence.

Her career so far has been in various multidisciplinary settings including criminal justice, anti-racist facilitation, community cohesion and development as well as specialist targeted support for young people.

How FLOURISH links to Participation

Polly is the Business Lead for CYPSA, supporting the work of the Alliance to deliver the Flourish ambition. She has a long and varied history in local government and the voluntary sector, working in areas including homelessness, children and young people, ex-offenders, bid writing and partnership working.

Matthew is Strategy and Partnership Implementation Lead within the Communities and Partnership directorate. He is leading on the roll out of Flourish across the Council and its partner agencies. Previously he was Head of Social Work in Kings Lynn and West, and then Head of Family Support in Kings Lynn and Breckland. He has held various leadership roles in children's services over the last fifteen years and gualified as a children's social worker in 2001.

The shared ambition of the children and young people's system is that Norfolk is a place where all children and young people can Flourish.

Flourish reflects what young people have told us is most important to them. Co-produced by the multi-agency Children and Young People Strategic Alliance (CYPSA) as an outcomes framework that enables partner organisations to work strategically together towards securing the impact and outcomes we want to see.

Flourish is for everyone working with children and young people. This session will introduce Flourish and the role of CYPSA, look at how participation is key to delivering the Flourish outcomes and explore how we can engage children, young people and families as equal partners in the process.

Building participation in research for practice

Time:	12.30 - 13.30

	Philips - UEA

Carlene is a Lecturer and Director of Admissions in Social Work at UEA . Originally from South Africa, she has both local and international experience in social work, probation and academic research. She is Co-Chair of UEA's Tackling Racism Taskforce and a BASW England Committee Member. Her various academic qualifications and professional experiences across a range of disciplines, led to specialist practice in areas of child protection, fostering and adoption, youth offending and restorative justice.

Georgia joined the Centre for Research on Children and Families in 2011, to begin an ESRC Post-Doctoral Fellowship, working with Professor Margaret O'Brien on a project looking at fatherinclusiveness in interventions for supporting separated/divorced parents. Georgia then worked on another ESRC funded project, looking at care planning for looked after children, and the role of the Independent Reviewing Officer. Since 2014, Georgia has worked on two significant and innovative, Nuffield funded projects: 2014-17, Counting fathers in; Men's experiences of the child protection system; and 2017-2019/20 Up Against It: Understanding the scale, pattern & dynamics of fathers' recurrent appearance in care proceedings. From 2021-22 she produced an independent evaluation of the Caring Dads programme in Blackburn with Darwen.

This session will showcase two examples of building participation and collaboration into research activity to advocate for change, better influencing and inspiring social work practice. We will briefly present what we did and why and make the case for increasing participatory and cocreated approaches to developing and evaluating services. There will also be time for discussion and questions.

Example one is 'How's Your Father', a piece of theatre based on academic research undertaken by Dr Georgia Philip at UEA, created by four organisations working together - Norwich-based theatre company The Common Lot, the School of Social Work at UEA, the Norwich charity Menscraft, and The NCC service Dads Matter. Example two is the Black and Ethnic Minority family members' lived experience of Children and Family services in the Local Authority. The University of East Anglia and Children's Services working to ensure that the voices and experiences of Black and Ethnic Minority family members are represented in the education of Social Workers. Drawing on the narratives of People with Lived Experience, we are creating a series of video interviews to support the training and education of staff and students.

Laura Gavrila is the Head of the Fostering Service for Norfolk County Council. The Fostering Service aims to achieve meaningful participation and engagement with foster carers to enable for the voice of the children to be clearly heard. The session will aim to explain how young people are provided with opportunities to have greater control over their lives through participation but also to illustrate the foster carers' role in building, maintaining and repairing relationships.

The session will also capture the importance of building and creating sufficient resilience within placements to enable positive and meaningful interactions.

More than just words

Jean is a Senior Social Worker in a Norwich In Care Team. She recognised the needs of child and young people from the Black and Ethnic communities were not being addressed and felt their voices needs to be heard and their views shared. Having consulted with the relevant managers, she tried to find a way to ensure young people from these communities could be supported and encouraged to get their views across. Jean developed and now co-runs the MTJW forum and is exploring a similar group for under 13s.

Lorna is a Children and Young People's Participation Officer and co-runs the MTJW forum alongside Jean. She has had the privilege of working with this group since the beginning of the year – Lorna is very passionate about elevating the voice of the under-represented and creating real change led by our young people. This group inspires and motivates her each time they meet.

In this session you will meet some of our progressive and inspiring young people from NiCC's participation group 'More Than Just Words' (MTJW for short!)

Together we want to:

- Educate and inform those around us of the difficulties we face
- Raise awareness of the cultural needs of care experienced children and young people, and reach as wide an audience as possible
- Explore how organisations outside of NCC work together to ensure children's needs are best met

What's worked well in engaging our young peopleTime:09.30 - 10.30Presenter:Laura Abbro & Lisa Hilson

Laura started in teaching following a career in business, she began in the primary phases, and developed practice around early literacy and gaps in education through management of the learning support centre and a period of time in the traveller education service. Laura is now an advisor in the virtual school. Lisa has been part of the UASC service since it began in 2019. The service has grown significantly and following a restructure is now the UASC Operational lead overseeing two teams.

We will be looking at what has been working well in engaging our young people to be active participants in, informing services of their particular needs and providing opportunities to young people to share their voice and advocate for themselves. We will show how we take opportunities to encourage active participation in order to inform service development and meeting the needs of young asylum seekers/refugees living in Norfolk. We will also explore barriers and what we are putting in place to overcome them.

Alex has a strong education background, having been a PE teacher in London for 13 years before working in outreach for the UEA, engaging with harderto-reach young people to encourage post-16 engagement with learning.

Sandy is a Practice Lead within the Practice Development Team and the Practice Coach Team manager.

The Children and Young People Strategic Alliance (CYPSA) is committed to having the views, wishes and aspirations of children and young people at the heart of their decision-making. As a lead partner, it is vitally important that Children's Services leads the way in this approach. In order to progress this work and ensure we are hearing from as many children and young people as possible, we need to find out whether, how, if and when they want to hear from and talk to us. One of the end goals is to create a 'panel' of young people across Norfolk who we can engage with on issues important to them.

This workshop will look at the work that is already underway to find this out and use the expertise in the room to explore the issue and develop ideas as to how we could best involve as many children and young people as possible in issues that are important to their lives.

Presenter: Lemn Sissay

Lemn Sissay OBE is a poet playwright, memoirist performer and broadcaster. Many will know that Lemn spent his child-hood in foster and residential care and in 2015, he brought a legal case against the government for critical mistakes in the first eighteen years of his life, which was settled out of court.

His memoir 'My name is Why' received awards from both The Pen Pinter Prize in 2019 and the Indie Book Awards non-fiction prize in 2021. Lemn Sissay was named MBE for services to literature by The Queen in 2014. In 2021 he was named OBE for services to Literature and Charity. He has honorary doctorates from Universities of Huddersfield, Manchester, Brunel, Kent and Essex. Lemn has been Chancellor of University of Manchester since 2015, which runs the The Lemn Sissay Law bursary, while the University of Huddersfield established and runs the first Lemn Sissay PhD scholarship for Care Leavers.

How to make people and organisations flourish through meaningful youth participation Presenter: Luke Rogers

Luke is a Lived Experience Leader and an awardwinning social entrepreneur, recognised through the award of the British Empire Medal (BEM) in the 2018 Queen's Birthday Honours List. He has 10 years' experience co-designing projects that enhance the experience of children in and leaving care. As a facilitator Luke has worked with the Department for Education, The Fostering Network and in 2020 was invited to be a Fellow at the Saïd Business School, Skoll Centre for Social Enterprise, at the University of Oxford and has supported organisations across the UK develop their engagement with young people.

By understanding and giving a voice to lived experience, we gain the knowledge to develop our services to best serve young people. This is a translation process, where stories are turned into strategies, ensuring children's social care is developed from the lives of the people who have experienced it.

He will be sharing his insights, passion for and expertise in creating projects that benefit the lives of young people to support Norfolk to listen, act and respond to the views of young people so we can ensure they flourish.

Rachel and her team are really impressed at how well you have all adopted the new approach to audit, explicitly drawing out the positives, highlighting and celebrating good practice. Rachel and her team recognise the importance of getting this right, they strive to ensure your hard work is valued and supported and that the practice is of a consistently high standard.

Natasha is a Life beyond Care Team Manager in the Norwich and South, working with a team of social workers and personal advisers to support teenagers as they prepare to leave care and beyond, up to their 25th birthday. Philip is a Head of Communities and Partnership and has led for CS on working collaboratively across the children and families' system in supporting effective practice and helping Norfolk to adopt a 'think family' approach to young carers. More recently he has had the privilege of working with young carers and young adult carers on co-producing the new transition assessment and plan that we hope all young carers will be offered in Norfolk.

Belinda works for Caring Together and is the lead for supporting awareness raising of young carers in schools and also supports Primary phase schools aspiring or achieving the education young carer tick friendly award. She is a passionate advocate for the voice of young carers and has worked with a broad range of organisations in highlighting the importance of listening to and working with children and young people that care for others.

Maria is the service manager for Carers Matters Norfolk, that provides support and guidance to young carers and adult carers across the county. Maria has supported the development and delivery of key services to support identify and support young carers in partnership with a number of delivery organisations from the third and voluntary sector.

The session will focus on the importance of meaningful engagement with young people that provide care for others and how working together can ensure that Children's Services and its partners are better able to identify and support young carers at the earliest opportunity reducing the risk of them undertaking excessive and inappropriate care. It is estimated that there could be up to 18,000 young carers in Norfolk and we are a long way from identifying and offering guidance and support to them all. The session will consider the approach to working with children and young people that are caring for others and how conversations as assessments enable us to better respond to their needs.

Now as an accredited FGC Coordinator, Julie has delivered more than a hundred Family Group Conferences to children and families.

Emma joined the FGC/FNA at NCC Team in May 2021, from Lincolnshire Children's Services, where she worked in Residential settings, tasked with creating the Life Story Work for Children in Care. Her passion is for promoting family's involvement, enabling parents to take ownership of their part but also look towards their child's future. Her work was acknowledged with a nomination to the Department of Education and a subsequent invite to afternoon tea with the Royal Family.
